August Wilson's JITNEY takes Riverwalk for a ride

One reviewer called it, "August Wilson's underappreciated masterpiece."

A New York Times review of the 2017 Broadway production of Jitney said it is Wilson's declaration not only that black lives matter, but that black life matters.

Jitney takes the Riverwalk stage October 18-21 and 25-28, directed by Vanessa Cunningham Sanders.

Set in 1977 in the Hill District of Pittsburgh, it focuses on the people who have set up an unlicensed taxi company.

There's a father-son generational clash, a Korean War veteran who is suffering from PTSD, although the world didn't really call it that then. There's a hotel doorman and an aging alcoholic with an occasional glimpse into a glittering past.

The Riverwalk cast includes Lekeathon Wilson as Youngblood, a Vietnam vet who drives; Guy Thomas as Turnbo, the driver who's a busybody; Chance Boyd as Fielding, the former tailor with an alcohol problem; Guy Stockard as Doub, the Korean War vet; Marcus Turner as Shealv. a numbers runner who uses the station as his base; Ralph Sims as Philmore. the doorman; Bruce

Wade as Becker, the man who runs the jitney station; Ken Nelson as his recently released-from-prison son; and Janell Hall as Rena, Youngblood's girlfriend, who refuses to forgive him for his past unfaithfulness despite his best efforts to show he has changed.

"Jitney is the first in Wilson's Pittsburgh cycle, which also includes Joe Turner's Come and Gone, Ma Rainey's Black Bottom and Fences." Wilson won the 1985 Pulitzer prize for Fences.

Shining Lives

The Riverwalk Black Box has been developing a habit of producing some pretty outstanding shows. *These Shining Lives* is no exception, and has certainly raised the bar for these performances. The story is relevant, and thought-provoking, and it was performed with excellence.

Taylor Rupp as Catherine Donohue made us excited to enter the workforce at

a time when women typically stayed at home. She was a pleasure to watch and her performance was captivating. The audience had the opportunity to ride up and down the emotional roller coaster Catherine Donohue experienced through Taylor's portrayal.

Erin Hoffman was impressive to watch. She played the brassy Charlotte, the strong co-worker that is difficult to get to know, but

who evolves into a solid and true friend to the others. Erin's performance was worthy of any professional stage, completely on point and refreshing to watch. Charlotte was fun. She was pushy and brash and completely fearless until fear was all she and her coworkers had left.

Erin Barger and Anasti Her added humor and depth to the ensemble, making this play a true team effort, and creating a believable scenario that was engaging to watch.


Heath and Charles Sartorius added balance to the ensemble, and it is always a pleasure to watch two generations on the same stage. Charles played multiple roles very well, moving through each of them seamlessly and with a precision that removed any ques-

tioning from the audience. Heath also played multiple roles, but was most prominent in his portrayal of Catherine's husband, Tom, first encouraging her in her quest for work; later failing to hear her fear that something was wrong. His performance added to the portrait of this regular family, just trying to get ahead, and facing great loss as a result.

This level of performance is uncommon for most community theatres. The cast worked well together and Sue Chmurynsky's direction was present and not heavy handed. Her resolution to the costume changes and the refreshing of the set were choreographed as part of the scene and done in such a way that it was not intrusive and did not diminish the performance in any way. I enjoyed this performance. The cast was interwoven and worked well together. The story was an excellent selection and it was very well done.

Based on the beloved 1968 film version of Ian Fleming's children's book, this musical comedy follows the Potts family and their fantasmagorical flying car on a journey of self-discovery and intrigue. Caractacus Potts: male, 30s to 40s.Brilliant but eccentric inventor, loving father, good-guy hero type. Strong acting, singing (baritone), and dancing.

Truly Scrumptious: female, 20s to 30s. Lovely, strong-willed heiress to the Scrumptious candy fortune. Ahead of her time – feisty, but loving. Strong acting/singing (soprano), some dancing.

Grandpa Potts: male, 50s to 60s. Caractacus' father – eccentric, not quite as brilliant - lovable Brit. Character acting, singing (baritone), some dancing. **Jeremy Potts:** male, 8-15. Caractacus' son. Genuine

Jeremy Potts: male, 8-15. Caractacus' son. Genuine and sincere, loves and believes in his father above all. Strong acting and singing (baritone or tenor).

Jemima Potts: female, 9-16. Caractacus' daughter. Cares deeply about looking after her brother and father. Strong acting/singing (alto/soprano).

Baron Bomburst: male, any age 18+. The nefarious ruler of Vulgaria. A truly petulant little man, he both hates and loves his domineering wife. Strong character acting, some singing (baritone) and dancing.

Baroness Bomburst: female, any age 18+. The power behind the throne of Vulgaria. Dotes on her childish husband, ironically, as she hates children above all. Strong character acting, singing (alto), and dancing.

Boris and Goran: male or female, any age 18+. Two bumbling Vulgarian spies tasked with obtaining Chitty Chitty Bang Bang for the Bomburst dynasty. The comic relief of the show. Strong character acting, some singing (baritone/alto), and some dancing.

The Childcatcher: male or female, any age 18+. The evil, creepy, and fiendish right hand of the Baroness Bomburst. Enforcer of Vulgaria's no-child policies. Strong character acting - likely double-cast in the ensemble.

The Toymaker: male or female, 18+. The put-upon royal toymaker helps foment the rebellion against the Bomburst regime. Acting, singing (alto/baritone), and some dancing – likely double-cast in the ensemble. **Adult/Kids ensemble:** 8-10 adults and 5 kids (8-17

years) to play multiple characters - will be very active, and need strong skills in acting singing and dancing

Be prepared to learn a dance combination and to perform a short reading from the script. Please bring a complete list of all conflicts from November 2018 through February 3, 2019 including weekends and holidays. Prepare an audition piece, 16-32 measures. Bring the sheet music. NO a capella singing allowed.
