Nick and Matt Lang, Brian Holden and Jeff Blim's innovative and hilarious musical parodies the video game series "The Oregon Trail."

Director Ayden Soupal discovered this StarKid video on YouTube about five years ago and "cried laughing throughout." After finding that StarKid shows are available for license, he was excited to submit it to Riverwalk.

Ayden has compiled quite a theatre background for his young age, starting at All-of-us Express, and starring in Riverwalk's Master Harold and the Boys in 2017. This is his second RWT directing project; the first was *Misery* last February. He will also direct The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Nighttime at All-of-us Express this coming May. You may also remember the insightful script Ernie's Life he wrote for our outdoor playreadings in 2021.

Ayden reports that after directing a small cast play, he set his sights on directing a musical, and found this small-cast script ideal, "...not only because it's funny, but because the music is great and the story is very sweet."

"Two of the standouts in the show are Ouentin Villa(Father) and Xia Skowronek (Son). They are both new to Riverwalk, and both crush it. Quentin has an amazing voice and is really quick on his feet, when it comes to

improv, and Xia is one of the funniest people you will ever meet.

"The other four cast members are returning to Riverwalk: Taren Going (You're a Good Man, Charlie *Brown*) bringing a humanity to the role while wanting to whoop her family, Dale Wayne Williams (Kinky Boots) never missing a comedic beat, Kaela Panicucci (Big Fish) belting beautifully, and JT Tosolt (Fabulation) making you want to join their bandit ways."

Ayden is pleased with his new team behind the scenes: Katrina Robinson (Stage Manager) and Drew Doman (Assistant Director) Lane Soupal, his sister, is choreographing for the first time and doing an outstanding job.

The Trail to Oregon is playing in Riverwalk's Black Box stage November 9-12 and 16-19. The Black Box has only about a third as many seats as the main stage, and general seating. Rocky Horror Sensational - in all senses of the word

Not for the faint of heart or prudish of mind, this ridiculous, campy fun-fest drew crowds of nostalgic 50-60-somethings who used to haunt the midnight movies in the 80s — as well as younger folks ready to sass back at the actors and have fun.

Directors Shannon Bowen and Erin Hoffman are not only proven co-stars *on*stage but also stellar co-directors offstage, capable of juggling two separate casts of leading characters — so they didn't have to do both 8 pm and midnight shows on the same night.

The wild wonderful workhorses performing in ALL the shows were: the ever popular Narrator Matt Ottinger with a spookier version of Quiz-Buster charm; Phantom Chorus: Erin Biel, Diego Collazo-Coca, Caila Conklin, Dinah DeWald, Taylor Haslett, Karrington Kelsey and Simon Rebeck—plus Nicole Martin and rockin' band: Lauren Spadafora, Yoshi Fukagawa, Charles Slocum, and Ty Schalter.

The long audience-participation tradition with the movie was honored with "Prop Participation Bags" sold before the show, including squirt guns, glow sticks and more. We were among the "collateral damage," well sprinkled near the front of the audience.

This tribute to the science fiction and horror B movies of the 30s through early 60s celebrates sleaze — but the "bad taste" was tastefully done with a wink of humor. Choreographer Amanda Tollstam also served as the much needed "intimacy coordinator." The set is clever and efficient (Ann Carlson Set

Design and Dressing) and the costumes are a treat (Morgan Bowen, assisted by Ashley Hampton and Samantha Hall-Loenhardt.)

The "Rocky" cast featured hospitably voluptuous Ny'Kieria Blocker as Usherette Trixie. TJ Kelly and Sally Hecksel made the most of their oblivious, celebratory loss of innocence. Carmen Zavala-Kelly was a sassy Columbia and Megan Malusek was a powerful Magenta. David Micheal Cooper was a streamlined body beautiful as Frank n Furter's creation, Rocky. Connor and Quinn Kelly came full circle from Frog and Toad with Connor burning up the stage on "Hot Patootie" and Quinn flashing his wheelchair stockings and garters. Lewis C. Elson fully inhabited in the role of Transsexual Transvestite Queen of the Castle Dr. Frank-N-Furter - and Brian Farnham led this all-good-singers cast with a sultry pout and a standout voice that raised the roof.

The "Horror" cast kept up the sensational standard set by the "Rocky" cast. See-

ing it a second time helped me further appreciate the Phantom chorus, who made even clearing trash and mopping the floor sexy.

The "Horror" cast delivered the sex, aliens and rock 'n' roll with more great voices: Robert Mueller as spooky Riff Raff, Kayla Henry as Usherette and cat-caller Trixie, and Travis Williams exploding in song as the ill-fated Eddie. Keara Hayes was a menacing, Magenta, and Tricia Rogers was lolly-popping fangirl Columbia. Luka Pawsek and Ron Meyer were "supersized" versions of the previous Frank-N-Furter and Rocky, with similar allure, charm and decadence. Brad (Michael Palmer) and Janet (Elena Billard) were again adorably naive charmers, and Dr. Scott (Alan Greenberg) looked appropriately inappropriate in his fishnets.

Directors Shannon and Erin have it figured out, as their note explains: "... beneath its surface silliness, the show tells a tale about initiation into a dangerous world, about surviving lost innocence, about deviance and acceptance, about creation, forgiveness, death and regeneration." *Jane Zussman*



The Exonerated combines firstperson narrative with legal records to tell the stories of six wrongfully convicted inmates and their paths to freedom, emphasizing their lives after being sentenced to death, including much of the legal proceedings that gained their exoneration.

Delbert - African-American, 60. A seminary dropout, radical and poet, he is like an old soul song; smooth, mellow and with an underlying rhythm that never lets up, with a substantial sense of humor in addition to his obvious depth.

Sunny - White - 50. A bright, Pixieish yoga teacher from California. Her lightness and positivity contrast with moments of great depth and clarity.

Robert - African-American, 30s.

A former horse groomer from the Deep South; hardened but not lacking a sense of humor. Deep rural Mississippi accent.

Georgia/Female Ensemble #1
-African-American, 30s. Robert's wife, also southern; opinionated outspoken female and extremely warm. She and Robert have a lovingly contentious relationship. Loves to speak her mind.

Gary-White, 45. A Midwestern hippie and an organic farmer. Clearly was in his element in the late 60s and early 70s, generally goodnatured, friendly, and quite smart.

Kerry-White, 45. A 19-year-old trapped in a 45-year-old's body, born and bred in Texas. Kerry was imprisoned for 22 of his 45 years and is eager to rediscover the world and connect with people. Strong Texas accent.

David - African American, 40. A gentle, sad man, born and raised in northern Florida (a.k.a. Southern Alabama). Has a very strong spiritual sense and had aspirations to the ministry before being put on death row at 18, battling between resignation and hope.

Sandra/Sue/Female Ensemble #2 - White, 40. Sandra is married to Kerry. Sweet, nurturing, loves Kerry dearly and has a great sense of humor about him. She has a strong Texas accent. Sue is married to Gary. Salt of the earth, an organic farmer with a strong upper midwestern accent - think Fargo.

Male Ensemble #1 - Both white, 35 to 50. These two play police officers, attorneys, suspects, and other supporting characters. Require highly versatile, commanding actors with dialects and characterization.

Since the play is based on real life characters, many of whom are still living, there are some, but limited opportunities for non-traditional casting. All actors will be considered.

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
