

"The play has evolved into what feels like a dreamscape. We are bearing witness to a confession and acknowledging a life that was once vibrant and complicated. The story never stops or wanes; it moves like a piece of music. It is measured in beats."

So reports director Amy Rickett, who has been acting and directing in the greater Lansing area since 1992. A non-speaking role as a townsperson in Riverwalk's Robin Hood led to an open call for Spotlight Theatre and becoming a member of the Spotlight Actors Workshop. She directed her first show in 2015: Riverwalk's Child's Play, and has been alternating between being onstage and offstage ever since.

Amy was drawn to this show for its humanity. She says, "I am not proficient in classical music or the history of famous composers, but I am drawn to the human condition and what it means to be in crisis. How do we manage defining moments? The relationship in this play between Salieri and Mozart is fiction, but the crisis of faith, what it means to be rewarded or not for hard work, loyalty, friendship, love, marriage and atonement are all part of our lives."

Amy feels fortunate to have had several actors come back and work with her again, notably Lewis C. Elson (Mozart) and Jeff Magnuson (Salieri) but the cast is a true ensemble, welcoming some new actors to Riverwalk as well as some familiar faces: Joe Clark, Laura Croff, Rachel Daugherty, Taylor Haslett, Nick Lemmer, Allison Meyer, Gay Oliver,

Michael Palmer, Mark Polzin, Bob Purosky, Ric Sadler, Michael Shalley, Elaine Simon, Lauren Spadafora, Eric Vincent, Aaron Wittbrodt, and Nathan Wood. These actors have had to learn languages, understand music composition and transport themselves back to the 18th century.

Amy credits her crew, Marcus Fields, Jan Ross, Leon Green, Ted Daniel. Tim Daniel. Ric Sadler. Kris Maier and her entire team, Leroy Cupp, Bob Nees, Scott Pohl, Gloria Vivalda and everyone who lent a hand in the shop.

"As the director, I am a small

part of what happens on and off stage. The collaboration of a collective group of people all working towards the same goal, sharing ideas and finding creative ways to make the play a success is what makes putting a show together exciting. Amadeus brought many helping hands, with expertise that I simply do not have and I am grateful for all the collaboration and sharing of ideas that this play has inspired."

Amy adds, "I want to take a moment to acknowledge the extraordinary work of my leading man Jeff Magnuson. I have known Jeff for over 30 years and — full disclosure — been married to him for the last 22. I have had the privilege of acting alongside him and directing him on occasion. He is dedicated, disciplined, creative, inventive, kind and remarkable as Antonio Salieri. Jeff is one of the best listeners I know and his ability to create moment to moment work is credit to all the years he has dedicated to the craft of acting. He is generous on stage and off. His patience has no limits. Jeff has the ability to find the honest, human emotions of every character he portrays, but his work on this show is enthralling. He will not like that I wrote this about him, but I feel that this might be the role he was always meant to play."

Amy is "wigged out" in a good way for this show and welcomes audiences to come along for the ride. Amadeus runs March 14-24, with tickets available online at www.riverwalktheatre.com or by calling the office at 517-482-5700.

First-time director, Alan Greenberg, masterfully guided the Riverwalk actors in deeply heighten drama, and subtle shifts from warm moving performances. Almost all of the audience, plus the cast and director, stayed for Talkbacks following the Saturday performances. Tracey Brame, Director of the Cooley Law School Innocence Project and Cooley Associate Dean of Experiential and Practice Preparation, led discussion with Gilbert Poole, an exoneree freed in 2020, 32 years after being wrongly incarcerated. An hour later, the audience was still gripped by their stories and asking more questions.

Farewell, Chris!

Chris Goeckel, Riverwalk's favorite monster, and spirited supporter of Lansing area theatre, passed away unexpectedly in a tragic bicycling accident on February 3, 2024, near his retirement home in Zellwood, Florida.

Chris found his way into theatre through his daughters, Amy and Alyssa, and thereafter

performed in 25 shows at Bath Theatre Guild, Lansing Civic Players, Starlight Dinner Theatre, Over the Ledge and Riverwalk — notably featured as The Monster in RWT's 2014 *Young Frankenstein*, for which he won a Barney Award.

A Celebration of Life was held at Reno's East in E. Lansing February 24 which served as a sad but enjoyable reunion for many of his theatre friends.





