Moonglow to light up Black Box

It must have been moonglow Way up in the blue It must have been moonglow That led me straight to you.

This 1933 jazz standard, performed and recorded by many through the 40s and 50s, evokes the memory of a past era that dances us into Kim Carney's surreal and touching script where elders drift in and out of memory and present-day reality.

There's humor and relatable real-life frustrations

and the challenges of getting an uncooperative mother with dementia into nursing home care — paired with surreal phantoms of mom's youthful self, and her youthful sailor paramour — her husband? Or an earlier version of Joe, a new friend also living at the nursing home?

Director Emily Clark has long been a fan of playwright Kim Carney, having directed her script The Home Team at Riverwalk in 2017 which won Best Play Thespie award and many Barneys. This script promises another captivating theatrical experience.

Emily says, "I've always been drawn to plays that don't go where you think they'll go.... Kim Carney has a great ability to find humor in things that are generally not thought of as funny. It has a lot of heart."

Involved in theatre since the age of 14, Emily loves to perform, but prefers directing. She has also directed shows at Starlight Dinner Theatre, Peppermint Creek Theatre, Over the Ledge, and Mason High School.

Emily is proud of her crew, "My directing team are all people I have worked with before because they are all perfect at what they do! I have tasked Ted Daniel to do the lights. He's trying very hard to accommodate my wishes which may be impossible." Ted is now challenged to bring Emily's vision to life in this story where lighting defines and blurs the lines



between time and memory.

Emily is also proud of her cast of veteran actors, Barb Stauffer and Doak Bloss are the elders, Maxine and Joe. Erin Hoffman and Frank Boston are their adult children coping with them — assisted by Filonna Thomas as an administrator at the nursing home. Storm Hawthorne and Connor Kelly are the remembered youthful versions of Maxine and Joe.

Emily reports, "The interesting part is that there are two characters that are elderly and two characters that are the young "memories" of the older two. Doak Bloss and Connor Kelly are essentially playing the same person at very different times in his life. They've been having a wonderful time watching each other to pick up mannerisms from each of them to make us believe that the young man grew up to be the old man." A similar process is going on with Storm and Barb.

Moonglow opens in Riverwalk's Black Box stage on April 11. General Admission tickets assure admission in case of a sellout in this smaller venue. Get there early for best seats. Make plans to attend today. Bring an elderly parent... or an adult child you're hoping won't put you in a nursing home! Moonglow promises to be a heart-opening experience for both Jane Zussman generations.

Amadeus Amazing

Every scene, script, and line Jeff Magnuson has memorized and performed from his very first play to this theatric moment has crescendeed into this immaculate performance of Antonio Salieri, the tragically flawed lead, in Riverwalk's *Amadeus*.

This isn't a sycophantic statement from an admirer but from an artist who has photographed astounding performances from hundreds of actors in over fifty-two Riverwalk Theatre productions since 2016.

Jeff performed an almost constant stream of dialogue for the entirety of

the play, pausing only long enough to allow the other veteran actors their opportunity to perform their hearts out.

Although Jeff's performance was a true marathon, there were other runners in the race. I've come to really enjoy the breadth of acting skill Lewis C. Elson brings to his parts; from aloof neighbor in *Bell, Book and Candle* to bawdy Frank-N-Furter in *Rocky Horror*, I was greatly anticipating this performance as Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart. Of course, he did not disappoint.

And neither did the delightful Taylor Haslett as the sweet and naïve Constance Weber. The three strong leads brought charisma, stamina, and elaborate facial expressions to communicate their characters' moods and attitudes.

With nineteen cast members, it would be impossible to give total credit to all involved, but other standouts were: Laura Croff and Lauren Spadafora as "The 'Little Winds', purveyors of gossip' flitting in and out at the most opportune moments—as well as Joe Clark, Bob Purosky, Eric Vincent, and Aaron Wittbrodt as the aristocrats of the era, who helped create a strong backbone for the plotline.

In addition to the actors, the costumes reigned. (Kris Maier and crew) Without such detailed outfits, from lacy sleeves to brass buttons,

this period piece would have fallen flat. There are some amazingly talented creators in our community and they came through for this production.

There are a lot of details in this production and I hope each audience member took the time to really appreciate all that went into this massive production. Once again Riverwalk Theatre, through the patiently talented direction of Amy Rickett, brought the best together to perform, entertain, and enrich the Greater Lansing Community.


